MARINE METRE SOUARED

The GATE science students are participating in a nationwide citizen science project called Marine Metre Squared. On Wednesday the 15th of May at the morning low tide they surveyed our local mudflats at Orangihina, Harbour View to find out about the species that live between the tides.

They worked alongside Dr Mels Barton the coordinator from the Marine Metre Squared project. We also had help from Sophie from Community Waitakere's environmental team and Auckland Zoo's education outreach team led by Frazer Dale. The students have now entered their data onto the national database and we have compared it to the data found by the 2018 GATE class. In Term Four the students will repeat the survey at the site to monitor any changes. A huge thank you to everyone involved with the morning and especially to Parth's Mum for her help.
