OUR RĀKAU RANGATIRA AND WAKA VALUES

At TAI, our core school values underpin everything we do - in learning, relationships, and how we care for our environment.

These values guide our decisions, shape our culture, and support our ākonga to thrive. They are reflected in our WAKA framework:

Fostering connection and a strong sense of belonging for all students in an inclusive environment.

ATAWHAI

KAITIAKITANGA

Taking responsibility for our environment, resources, ourselves, and others.

AKO

As part of living these values, and through our ongoing partnership with Te Kawerau ā Maki, our kura is proud to introduce our Rākau Rangatira for 2026. This kaupapa strengthens our connection to Aotearoa, our whenua, and our school environment, reflecting the deep knowledge and guidance generously shared by Te Kawerau ā Maki.

Our four guiding rākau are **Kauri**, **Kōwhai**, **Pōhutukawa**, and **Tōtara**. MUSIC AT TAI



On behalf of the Music Department, we welcome you to Te Atatū Intermediate.

We take pride in offering our students a range of musical opportunities.

In addition to classroom music, we provide instruction in various instruments.

Research shows that playing a musical instrument enhances reading, numeracy, communication, and social skills.

We have seen the positive impact this has had on our students, many of whom become leaders and top achievers in their educational journeys.

It is now your child's turn to "Give it a go!"

Join us for this special evening to explore which instrument they might like to learn.

Our school offers free group tuition in the following instruments:

Violin, Trumpet, Trombone, Euphonium, Flute, Clarinet, Saxophone, and Percussion (excluding the Drumkit).

Students who choose to learn these instruments will be expected to participate in a performance group.

Our performance groups include:

String Ensemble, Beginner Concert Band, Advanced Concert Band, and Rock Bands (by audition).

Private tutors offer paid individual lessons in:

Keyboard/Piano, Guitar, Bass Guitar, and Drum Kit for \$30 - \$35 per lesson.

Group lessons in Guitar may be possible in consultation with the tutor.

Students must provide their own instruments. Most instruments can be rented for \$160 to \$400 per year, depending on the instrument.

The school has a limited number of instruments available for hire.

Band students would also need to purchase the tuition book "Tradition of Excellence" for around \$48 and Violin students, \$23.

MUSIC AT TAI

CLASSROOM Music

Learning through music stimulates creative action and responses by engaging and connecting thinking, imagination, senses and feelings.

In music, students learn to work independently and collaboratively. Learners in the arts are able to view their world from new perspectives.

All TAI students in Year 7 & 8 participate in the class music programme. They come with half their class for 2 terms, (approx 14 - 16 hrs).

Students experience a diverse programme that includes hands-on playing, listening, creating, and some use of technology in music.

Lessons are group-based and run for 30 minutes.

Students leave class at their allocated time to attend lessons alongside other students learning the same instrument.

Students are required to provide their own instrument. Most instruments can be rented for an annual fee of approximately \$200-\$400, depending on the instrument, with a limited number also available for hire through the school.

Students will also need to purchase the tuition book Tradition of Excellence, which costs approximately \$48.

VIOLIN Programme

FREE GROUP LESSONS AVAILABLE

These are all group lessons for 1/2 hour at a time. Students are required to provide their own violin. Violins are available for hire from \$160 per year. The school has a limited number of violins available for hire.

Students would also need to purchase the tuition book for \$23

SPORT AT TAI

TAI offers four different levels of sport, giving students the opportunities to play anywhere, from social fun to top-level competition.

LEVEL ONE

The focus here is on "having a go," school spirit, and staying active with friends. These are "open" to everyone.

- Lunch time sports - Focuses on Inter-Class and Inter-Mini School competition.
- Afterschool social league - Sports like Basketball, Netball, Running Club and Waterpolo. *These rely on our community of parent volunteers.*
- Major school (inhouse) events - Our annual sporting events. Everyone participates, from those aiming for records to those dressing up in Rākau colours for fun. Athletics Day, Waka Wars, Colour Run.

LEVEL TWO

The focus shifts to skill, teamwork, and representing the school

- Zone Day Sports - This level involves one-day tournaments against West Auckland schools. Entry into these teams is via a trial process. The Sports Coordinator appoints coaches for each code, and team selection is determined by a combination of technical skill and player attitude. *Teams that secure first place at the Waitakere Zone level qualify to compete in the Auckland Championships.*

LEVEL THREE

The highest level of commitment, designed for athletes who want to push their limits.

- Sports Camp - A week-long competition at Totara Springs, Matamata, against schools from the Auckland, Waikato, and Bay of Plenty regions. Students compete across more than 20 codes, ranging from rugby, netball, and volleyball to petanque, chess, and croquet. This event is highly competitive, and we will send out best team. Once teams are selected, students are expected to be 100% committed to the designated training programme. *This year, trials will begin term 1 for Year 8s only.*

LEVEL FOUR

Elite performance and National Excellence

- NZAIMS - The Zespri AIMS Games is the pinnacle of intermediate school sport in Australasia. Held annually in Tauranga, this week-long national tournament. *We only send individual athletes to compete in their specific codes rather than sending full teams. Participation requires formal permission from the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) and the Board of Trustees.*



SPORT AT TAI

SPORTS SIGN-UPS: HOW IT WORKS

To help our families stay organised, we have a streamlined process for sports registrations.

Here is everything you need to know:

1. STAY INFORMED

Information regarding sign-ups and upcoming training sessions will be sent via email. However, students are also encouraged to take initiative by checking:

- The Student Notices on the Landing Page
- The Sports Board (Located in the student foyer, opposite the staffroom)

2. THE SIGN-UP PERIOD

During the designated sign-up week, registration happens at the covered courts.

- When: Every lunchtime for the first 15 minutes only.
- How: Students find the sheet for their sport and sign up with our Student Leaders.
- Important: If the leaders have left the courts (after the first 15 minutes), the sign-up window for that day has closed.
- Note: Occasionally, a single sport may have a separate sign-up period, which will be communicated individually.

3. GENERAL INFORMATION & FEES

Once the week concludes, I will collect the data and send a general update to parents.

- For sports with fees: You will receive an "Expression of Interest" form. This outlines the costs and event details so you can confirm your child's participation.

4. TRIALS & ZONE DAYS

If a sport requires trials, dates and times will be communicated via email and the sports board.

- Required Gear: It is essential that students have their full PE gear and any necessary sport-specific equipment on trial days.
- Zone Days: These require trials as we take our strongest teams to compete against other schools across Auckland.
- If a student doesn't make a Zone Day team, we offer lunchtime opportunities throughout the year for everyone to enjoy these sports.

5. FINAL PERMISSION

If your child is selected for a team, you will receive a final email containing the Permission and Health Forms.

MEETING POINT: 7:30 AM IN SCHOOL HALL

SPECIALIST & TECHNOLOGY LEARNING

Our Specialist programme offers students opportunities to explore creativity, physical wellbeing, performance, and critical thinking through a range of engaging subjects. Students rotate through specialist and technology classes across the year, developing new skills, confidence, and interests along the way.

SCIENCE – WITH WHAEA BARBARA

Students investigate the world through hands-on experiments, problem-solving, and inquiry learning. The focus is on curiosity, questioning, evidence gathering, and thinking like scientists. Optional Science Badges are available for students who want to extend their learning.

PE/SPORT – WITH WHAEA VANIA

Students take part in a variety of inclusive and active experiences that build confidence, teamwork, and a positive attitude toward movement. Lessons include a range of physical activities designed to be fun, engaging, and accessible for all.

VISUAL ARTS – WITH WHAEA STACEY

Students attend Art once a week for two terms, exploring different media, techniques, and creative processes. The year begins with a cultural identity project where students create artwork inspired by their heritage. Optional Art Badges are available for students who wish to extend their creativity.

MUSIC – WITH MRS CHALMERS

All Year 7 and 8 students participate in Music for two terms (approximately 14–16 hours). Students explore creativity through practical activities such as playing instruments, singing, rhythm work, movement, and digital music creation. Learning experiences include bucket drumming, ukulele, keyboard, composition, and exploring New Zealand music, while developing both independent and collaborative skills.

DANCE & DRAMA – WITH WHAEA TANIA

Dance and Drama runs for half the year with each class group. In Dance, students use kupu Māori to create movement and choreography. In Drama, students develop performance skills by writing and performing their own monologues, including pieces inspired by the legend of Māui.

CREATIVE MEDIA – WITH WHAEA DEB

Photography, filming, editing, and stop-motion animation, with a focus on storytelling that informs, entertains, and inspires.

FOOD TECHNOLOGY – WITH WHAEA AMANDA

Students learn to cook famous recipes while developing food safety knowledge and practical kitchen skills.

SOFT MATERIALS – WITH WHAEA MARIEE

Exploration of natural materials, stitching techniques, biomaterials, and creative ways to repurpose plastics and by-products.

HARD MATERIALS – WITH MR DEMPSEY

Students design and build automata (mechanical kinetic toys) while learning to safely use workshop tools and machinery.

Important: On Technology days, students must wear closed-toe shoes (school or PE shoes).

TECHNOLOGY WEDNESDAYS & MOTAT VISITS

During Terms 1 and 2, classes will attend Technology Wednesdays at MOTAT, taking part in the Invent a Machine programme.

Students will explore engineering and design thinking by building machines using levers, pulleys, and gears. Back at school, they'll extend this learning by designing hovercrafts and experimenting with M-Bots.

Together, our Specialist and Technology programmes aim to develop confident learners who are curious, creative, and ready to explore new ideas. We're looking forward to an exciting year of discovery and hands-on learning for all students!

SCHOOL BADGES

Our school badges are a popular incentive that encourage ākonga to step outside their comfort zones, try new activities, and give their best effort. Badges are proudly stitched onto students' polo shirts – most students choose to dedicate one shirt to display all their achievements.

Students can earn badges by representing TAI in academics, arts, community, cultural, sports, and a range of other areas. Throughout their time at TAI, students have the opportunity to earn multiple academic badges, as well as badges in other areas of school life. Here's how some of our badges work:

ART BADGE – OUTDOOR ART EXPLORER

Interested students can collect a task sheet from the art room detailing specific requirements and activities designed to inspire creativity and connection with the outdoors. Once completed, all work and reflections are submitted to Whaea Stacey for evaluation. Successfully meeting the criteria earns the Outdoor Art Explorer Badge, celebrating exploration and artistic expression.

MATHS BADGE – MATHS GOLD CLUB

Each term, students receive a sheet with 400 basic facts questions (100 per operation). Sections must be completed within set timeframes, with Year 7 and Year 8 students having their respective limits. Students who score 100% across all four sections receive the Maths Gold Club Badge. Those scoring 390–399 can attempt a Round 2 to try for a perfect score and earn their badge.

WRITER'S BADGE

Students can earn a Writing Gold Club Badge by fulfilling the specific publishing and technical requirements for their teacher-designated level. These requirements range from producing three pieces in different genres for Criteria 1 to completing ten pieces—including two long-form works and a leadership component—for Criteria 4. READING BADGE

Reading badges are awarded to students who meet specific reading targets throughout the term. [Targets can be found here.](#)

SCIENCE BADGE

All students can extend their learning through Science Badges, which allow exploration in their areas of interest. This program can continue into high school for students aiming to complete every badge! More information is available [here](#).

No makeup – fake eyelashes, fake nails, nail polish, eyeliner etc

What happens if I have to wear a non-uniform item to school?

- Bring a signed note from your whanau to explain the incorrect uniform and when you will have the correct uniform.
- Hand the note to the teacher. Your teacher needs to sign and date when they have received this note.
- Keep this note safe for the duration of time you need.


