### **NATURE IN THE BALANCE**

"Climate change", "Global warming", "Mass extinction", however, you want to look at it, it's a problem. A big one. Billions of tonnes of CO2 is vomited into the atmosphere annually! We are literally suffocating our own planet. The sad part is that most aspects of daily living contribute to carbon emissions. Pesticides kill soil, human expansion causes habitat destruction, livestock contributes massively to both CO2 emissions and habitat loss, and they all contribute to climate change.

First, livestock. Animal domestication has been a part of human life since the beginning of the Holocene, whether it's cats and rabbits or pigs and cows. The meat and dairy industry produces 36% of all global carbon emissions, an unfathomable 13.4 billion tonnes annually. But it doesn't end thereforests are often cleared to make way for animal paddocks or plantations, destroying numerous wildlife habitats and ecosystems. This destruction of our natural world will continue as long as the population rises. We must take Action.

But we cannot just kill all livestock and destroy all plantations/farms. The thing is these industries are so ingrained into the global economy that their downfall will have catastrophic consequences. These Corporate Titans offer jobs to millions of people as well as carrying the economies of countless countries. It will take a colossal effort to shift these people and economies to truly get rid of them in a slow process.

Not only is the natural ecosystem being massacred; we are killing our precious fertile land via pesticides. Pesticides were invented during WW2 as a toxic gas to kill people, but now we are killing the microbes in the soil we harvest food from. The soil gets less and less fertile without that microscopic life causing the ground to be pretty much dead. Did I mention that pesticides can linger within the soil for years or even decades?! The damage has been done; soon we will face consequences.

Overfishing. You have probably heard this term before, it is basically taking more than we should and causing an imbalance in the natural ecosystem with overpopulation and threat of extinction. Although there is a legal limit on different species and you can only kill them at a certain size and/or age, these laws are not enforced and most take far more than the legal limit making the laws pointless unless enforced. Some activist groups have campaigned for cameras to be placed on fishing vessels as a way to monitor activity and punish those who disobey.

Trawling is another activity troubling the world's oceans with the destruction of coral reefs. Trawling is dragging a steel net across the ocean floor - tearing up the ground and catching fish before pulling it up and getting rid of all that you do not want - which is often the majority of the catch. Not only is it a vast waste of already dead fish, but it can cause permanent damage to coral reefs. Did I mention that 25% of marine life lives in reefs?! If we do not do something soon we will never be able to reverse the damage.

Indonesia is a nation made up of over 18,000 islands with impenetrable rainforests stretched across the surface. Unfortunately through poaching, habitat destruction, and logging, the rainforest is being destroyed more and more each year. The cornerstone of the Indonesian economy is palm oil, and due to the land required to mass produce this substance, thousands of hectares of jungle have been cleared to make way for palm oil plantations. Many species have already gone extinct because of this industry, but, why, you may ask? Corruption is often the result of avarice, people will always want more.

All of Earth has been through countless geological changes. In fact, the worst mass extinction in the history of the planet was the great death at the end of the Permian. Global temperature rise in turn caused mass Genocide and imbalance; it wiped out 95% of life on Earth. That will be the fate of the earth in less than a century if we do not do something. We are facing a crisis of insane scale with gigantic stakes. Ecological change has already caused imbalance and destruction, and will soon cause extinction. The oceans and the forests are the lungs and body of the Earth, and we are practically forcing a cigarette down their throat. destroying them in a multitude of ways, this will last until the end of mankind. If we put in our full effort we just might be able to survive.
