Individual suggestions for improvement will be reviewed carefully as we continue to strengthen our planning and practice.

One key theme that emerged from the feedback was communication. We acknowledge this as an important area for growth and will be reviewing how we can communicate more clearly and effectively with our community moving forward. Your insights are invaluable, and we genuinely appreciate the time and thought that went into your responses.

A reminder that our upcoming Teacher Only Day will focus on the revised English curriculum. With the Ministry of Education's updates released just two weeks ago, our staff will be spending the day unpacking the new curriculum in full - exploring how it applies to teaching and learning at the intermediate level. We will also continue our work around Structured Literacy, which has been increasingly embedded across the primary sector this year. The pace of curriculum change has been constant, with little lead in time which has caused frustrations in the education sector. This professional learning will help ensure TAI is working through the changes and we will continue to be consistent in progression for the needs of our learners.

Finally, A huge thank you to everyone who supported our Athletics Day, whānau, staff, and students alike. This year our focus was on participation, involvement, and sportsmanship, celebrating both competitive and non-competitive achievements. It was fantastic to see so many students giving their best effort, encouraging each other, and embodying our school values throughout the day.

MEASLES INFORMATION

Although we currently have no cases in our school or community, the recent news about measles cases may have caused concern. To confirm, while we currently have no confirmed measles cases in our school, we want to share the official guidance from Health New Zealand / Te Whatu Ora so you know exactly what to expect.

Key Health Guidance
All students should continue to
attend school regardless of their
vaccination status.

If a case is confirmed,

- Public Health will check the school roll against the Aotearoa Immunisation Register.Only unvaccinated or partially vaccinated close contacts of the confirmed case may be asked by Public Health to stay home (quarantine).
- Public Health officials will contact those affected directly with specific instructions.
- Fully vaccinated students and staff will be able to return to school once their status is confirmed by Public Health.

Public transport services for 2026

Kiaora,

With the end of the school year approaching, we want to reach out to schools and parents with information about public transport in readiness for 2026. The beginning of the school year, from the second week of February through until Easter, see a sharp increase in demand on Auckland's roads and public transport as schools and universities commence and people return to work from summer holidays. There will be more people than usual on the roads and using public transport services, especially during peak hours. Each year, Auckland Transport reviews the performance of the network from February to April of the previous year, including school bus services and other popular services. We have already reached out to schools across Auckland asking for roll changes to plan ahead. Here are three things parents and students can do to help ease the impact on school journeys during this busy time:

- •Ensure student's HOP cards are topped up. Children ages 5 to 15 are eligible for a child concession giving them 40% off travel by bus, train or ferry when using their registered AT HOP card. For information on how to set up concessions search 'AT HOP card' online.
- •Encourage students to tag on and off each school bus trip. It is important that everyone tags onboard so we can get accurate information about how many students are onboard each bus. This information is used to make informed adjustments to school bus timetables and bus sizes.
- •Plan ahead for the busy season. If school buses are not an option for students, they can use urban bus services. You can use AT Journey Planner to find the service that will work best for them. Please know that public transport services will be busier than usual, so it's important to allow enough time for them to arrive early to get their bus, train or ferry in case there are queues.
