MESSAGE FROM MR EVANS - TUMUAKI

Tēnā koutou katoa o Te Atatū Intermediate whānau

Happy Diwali and Fakaalofa Atu as we celebrate Niue Language Week!

It's another big week in education, with the mega strike action on Thursday 23 October and significant changes being introduced to the new English and Mathematics curriculums. I don't often like to get political; however, the current Mathematics curriculum—which we have already begun implementing with support, templates, and professional learning—has again been changed without meaningful collaboration with schools or principals, with implementation expected 2026.

These new curriculums will now cover Years 0–10 in both English (previously Y0-6 and an expected Y7-13) and Mathematics (Y0-8 begun this year). Further changes are also planned for Years 11–13, with our current Year 8 cohort likely to be the first group affected by the new senior-level curriculum when it is introduced. These constant changes with limited implementation time are causing frustrations within the education sector.

This makes our upcoming Teacher Only Day on Thursday, 21 November, even more important, as we focus on upskilling all staff in these new curriculum changes and the structured literacy approach. As a school, our priority remains to plan, teach, and assess effectively to support quality learning for all students. We aim to balance current best practices with the evolving expectations set by the Ministry of Education.

Thank you to everyone who has already completed our consultation form to support the school's review process. We have received a small number of responses so far and would love to hear from more of our community. Your feedback helps us celebrate what's going well and identify areas where we can strengthen or adjust our approach. The link to the form is provided below.

Wishing everyone a relaxing Labour Day weekend—a sure sign that summer is on its way! We look forward to seeing all students back on Tuesday, refreshed and ready for the final exciting 7 weeks of the year.

Please note that our Hākinakina Day has been rescheduled from next Thursday to **Week 5**,



SCIENCE AT TAI

Over the last 18 months, Te Atatū Intermediate has been working to enhance the teaching and learning of science across both our specialist and classroom programmes. This term, we are carrying out a review of Science at TAI to help shape future plans.

In the Science Specialist programme this year, students have been learning about the Nature of Science and developing their science capabilities. In the Material World (Chemistry) strand, they explored mystery powders, states of matter, oobleck, dissolving, and the pH scale, including making sherbet, and were introduced to the periodic table. In the Physical World (Physics) strand, students have been — or will be in Term 4 — investigating forces and speed, bungy jumping Barbies, and designing and testing foam rollercoasters.

In the classroom programme last term, students explored Navigation and Wayfinding and learnt about the importance of observation, culminating in the Waka Hourua STEM Challenge. Congratulations to Room 1 for designing the Winning Waka, and a big thank you to Matua Jeff, Ms Harrington, Mr Dempsey, and Whaea Stacey for their support with the Grand Final!

This term, our classroom focus shifts to CSI Forensic Science, where students will become forensic scientists — investigating fingerprints, fibres, chromatography, spatters, and more, while learning about the importance of evidence. A big thank you to Constable Jude, our School Community Officer, for lending us resources.

Alongside these programmes, our Enviro Kaitiaki Leaders have been out at Orangihina, connecting with scientists Dion Pou and Chez Panapa from the RiverCare Group – Te Wai o Pareira and with Grant Routen. Their mahi continues to focus on protecting and monitoring our local te taiao. On the last Friday of Term 3, they took part in a coastal clean-up with Peninsula Primary School as part of the Keep Te Atatū Peninsula Beautiful campaign. Next Friday, students will continue the annual Marine Metre Squared monitoring work that Te Atatū Intermediate has been carrying out since 2018 — mahi which was also proudly showcased at the EcoFest community event earlier this year.
