Marine Metre Squared and Hauraki Gulf Monitoring Project

On Thursday the 22nd of September 2022 the Scientist of the Future class was lucky enough to participate in a project called Marine Metre Squared as part of the Hauraki Gulf Monitoring Project. Since 2018 the school has been involved with this project to help monitor the mudflats at Orangihina. We were guided by Elle Uleland, a Marine Biologist from the University of Otago's Marine Studies Centre and were also joined by local Ecologist Dion Pou from Te Atatū Marae Coalition who shared his expertise and knowledge about the area. We were also lucky enough to have help from Sustainable coastlines and Isla's Mum, Armani's Mum and Mackenzie's Dad.

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We used a 1 by 1 metre square to get samples of the mud in the area to get a good idea of what animals and plants live on and in the mudflats. We identified each animal and shell we were able to find and took notes of it on our data sheet. And when we got back to school we put our data into the website: https://www.mm2.net.nz/. We would like to thank Elle, Dion, our parent helpers and Sustainable Coastlines, without you this wouldn't have been possible.
